Casual Treasury Services Representative University Casual Pool

Purpose

Reporting to the Treasury Services Manager, the Treasury Services Representatives are located in the Cashier Office and are responsible for centralized treasury cashier functions. Treasury Services Representatives provide vital customer service to students and all business units of the University. As part of our casual pool of employees available on an on-call basis, you may be called in to assist during peak periods, vacation or sick leave coverage.

Responsibilities

Duties include but are not limited to:

- Responding to specific student account inquiries and all general inquiries, in accordance with policies and regulations concerning confidentiality and protection of privacy;
- Processing payments, deposits, transfers, and refunds, including those related to student accounts/tuition, housing, parking, library, bookstore and print/copy, and various cash disbursements, while ensuring internal policies and controls are maintained;
- Reconciling and balancing cash drawers and tills, online activity and payments, coin counts etc., including preparing balancing reports and journal entries;
- Organizing and managing cash floats and handling and tracking deposit bags for all business units of the University;
- Issuing photo I.D. cards and bus pass stickers, issuing safety lab stickers, encoding card data;
- Training administrative personnel (i.e. regional campuses, departments) and acting as resource on money handling policies and procedures to all business units; and
- Organizing daily office work activities and schedules, developing business processes and procedures.

Qualifications

The successful candidate will possess a two-year diploma in accounting/business together with a minimum of three years' experience handling large cash volumes and online payments, operating point of sale terminals, balancing cash and payments, and preparing journal entries preferably in a post-secondary and/or financial services environment. Additional experience in accounting and knowledge of university structures, fees, policies, and procedures would be considered an asset. An equivalent combination of education and experience will be considered.

Proven ability in the use of MS Office Suite (Office outlook, Word, Excel, Access, etc.), web-based applications, and experience with Banner or a similar relational database is essential. The candidate must also demonstrate strong leadership, interpersonal and customer service skills to effectively serve students and staff, and be able to work under the stress of peak periods during student registration. The successful candidate will have the ability to work both independently and as a member of a team. This



role requires excellent attention to detail, strong analytical, organizational, and communication skills, and demonstrated ability working with confidential information and privacy legislation (FOIPPA).

The successful candidate must be able to obtain and provide the results of a clear Criminal Record Check prior to appointment.

Salary

This position has been classified at a Grade 6, \$32.34/hr. The casual hourly rate of pay shall be at Step 1 for the Grade when filling a position that has been rated by the Job Evaluation Committee.

As part of our Casual Pool, employees are available on an on-call basis, and may be called in to assist during peak periods, vacation, or sick leave coverage. Normal hours of work are between 8:30am – 4:30pm Monday through Friday.
