Field Applications in Resource Management

(NREM 333 / NRES 798) August 19 - 30, 2024 Course Introduction and 1st Assignment

The 2023 Field Camp will be held this year from August 19-30. The theme of this year's field camp is "Maintaining Stand Complexity and Ecosystem Services". Field Camp will be delivered in a modular format with one or two modules taught each day. Module topics range from 'Considering Wildlife Values in Forest Management' to 'Wetbelt Stand Dynamics. The major project of the course will be the development of a high-level plan using integrated resource management principles covered in the course. The case study for the plan is a real, and not a fabricated-make-work, scenario. You, as field camp students, will be involved in crafting a management strategy for a germane issue in the John Prince Research Forest, near Fort St. James, BC.

Aside from the first four or five days of field camp, activities are planned to take place exclusively in the area of the John Prince Research Forest. The JPRF is a remote camp. Since the majority of our activities will be in the field, students are expected to bring all of the field gear necessary for comfortable working conditions (this includes personal apparel from cork or hiking boots to bug repellent, rain gear, hat, cruise vests, work gloves, field note books (You will be marked on your field note books; bring several waterproof notebooks as well as one that is not waterproof that you may want to use for indoor lectures), calculator, felt markers, pencils, pens, etc., but does not include specific tools such as clinos and increment borers; these will be provided). You **must** bring your own life jacket or PFD!! Please bring bear spray if you like. Also, some students find ear plugs to come in handy for sleeping when bunking with other students. We encourage you to bring a camera (we have an annual photo contest), laptop, and/or ipad if you use those for field work. We also encourage you to bring your own tent if you want to have your own private space.

If you wear eyeglasses, you should consider bringing an extra pair. You will also be required to bring your own toiletries (but not toilet paper), prescription meds (please bring an epi-pen if you are allergic to insect stings), linens (pillow, bedding and towels). Bunk beds are provided in the cabins. The research station does have some areas with a cellular connection. Laundry facilities proper are not available. A washtub will be provided but clothes will need to be air-dried. Bathrooms and outhouses are provided for restroom needs. Showers are available but a lottery system will be established since hot water resources and wastewater disposal are limited. It is a good idea to bring a flashlight. Please bring binoculars if you have them. Musical instruments and coffee mugs are also welcome.

With the exception of the first few days of the course (you'll need to provide your own meals and provide your own accommodation in Prince George on the first few days), all meals and accommodations will be covered by your course fees. Snacks (special candy bars, pop, etc.) are not available to purchase at the camp so please bring your own if you have a sweet tooth. Catering will provide cookies and other sweets. Please alert us to any allergies that you may have or if you have any dietary restrictions. Note: If there are students in this course who, because of a disability, may have a need for special accommodations, please come and discuss this with me, or contact Disability Services located in room 1048 in the Teaching and Learning Center.

You should be aware that UNBC has a strict policy on drug and alcohol use. As indicated at https://www2.unbc.ca/youth/policies

"Prohibited conduct includes possessing or using intoxicating beverages in areas other than those given specific authorization by the University's Liquor Policy and possessing and/or selling illegal drugs or narcotics." **Do not** bring these items or guns with you to field camp. Personal vehicles and student's pets are **NOT** allowed at camp.

Field camp starts on August 19th at 0900 at the Prince George UNBC Campus in room 5-154. Please bring all of your field gear (most students use a medium-sized Tupperware tub) to room 5-154 on day 1 and to parking lot B where we'll meet every morning following day 1. Parking is available on campus, but requires the purchase of a parking pass.

Assignment 1: To help the field camp coordinator and the instructors assess your background, we request that you submit a two-page assignment to us by July 30th detailing your field experiences with integrated resource management issues. You must indicate whether or not you possess any relevant certificates (e.g., first aid, danger tree assessor) or special licenses (class 4 driver's license). Also, please let me know if you do not want to be photographed at camp. Lots of pictures will be taken and you will appear in some. We would also like you to tell us in a paragraph or two what INTEGRATED RESOURCE MANAGEMENT means to you. This will be your first assignment and will be marked based on those items requested herein (your mark will depend upon you following instructions as much as content): it will comprise 5% of your field camp grade. Please include in your two-page assignment: all of your contact information including a current address, phone number and email address at which you can be reached between July 30 and August 15th. It is also necessary for you to indicate (**IN BOLD CAPS**) whether or not you have allergies or dietary restrictions (e.g., vegetarian or not) or medical conditions that we should be aware of as well as an emergency contact number in case something were to happen to you at camp (These two items must appear at the very top of your assignment). Because the coordinator/instructors and camp cook of the course are interested in knowing everyone on a personal basis, we also require that you submit a photograph of yourself (head-shot) along with your write up as part of your first assignment (part of the two pages) so that we can commit your names to memory before you arrive. Once your photo is embedded in your text document, convert the entire assignment to pdf and give it the name: NREM 333 First Assignment_John Doe (your name). Submit your pdf assignment by July 30th to reav@unbc.ca for full marks. One half mark will be removed for every day your assignment is late.
