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Message from the HRI Co-Leads

As co-leads of the UNBC's Health Research Institute (HRI) we are pleased to submit the 2024-25 annual report for the HRI. In 2024-25, the HRI team has implemented new HRI initiatives (HRI Connect, Knowledge Synthesis Centre sustainability pilot), hosted or co-hosted many health research events and successfully co-led an institutional funding proposal to CFI/BCKDF which aims to support health equity for northern, rural and indigenous communities through a transformative health research infrastructure proposal. All of our activities underscore the importance of UNBC's HRI strategic approach to advance Health Research in Northern BC in line with our <u>Mission</u> to help in the creation and sharing of knowledge that increases the health and well-being of individuals, families, and communities.

This year, established Co-lead Dr. Sarah Gray, was joined by Dr. Trina Fyfe as Interim co-lead, to lead HRI activities that reflect the strategic directions of the HRI, as determined by the HRI Leadership Council. Trina also serves as the UNBC University Librarian and her engagement as the Interim Co-lead role has significantly advanced Knowledge Synthesis Centre activities through partnership with the UNBC Library. Dr. Margot Parkes, stepped away as HRI Co-lead during a 1-year term as Interim Dean for the Faculty of Human and Health Sciences (FHHS), remaining active as an HRI Leadership Council Member and Academic Lead for several HRI Initiatives. As HRI Co-leads we remained focused on stability, longevity and advancement of the HRI. We continue to make strides towards financial stability for the HRI, expansion of HRI services to a broader range of members and a continued commitment to providing collaborating and convening events for health researchers across Northern BC and beyond.



Message from the HRI Co-Leads, Continued

Three key initiatives achieved in 2024-25 reporting period (April 2024 – March 2025) include; 1. Socialization and uptake of HRI Connect to support HRI member collaboration and streamline HRI communications. 2. Advancement of partner driven knowledge synthesis projects with Northern Health through a partner-funded Knowledge Synthesis Librarian (0.5 FTE) and student research assistants. 3. Co-leadership of a UNBC/Lheidli T'enneh First Nation/UBC/NH partnered proposal for a Northern Hub for Health Research on UNBC and UHNBC campuses.

Building on successful precedents, our 2024-25 report exemplifies the scope and importance of diverse partnerships as central to HRI's success and contributions to strengthening Health Research in Northern BC, which is facilitated by HRI co-lead and leadership council member who interact with NH, BCSPOR, PHSA, Health Research Council of BC, RCCbc and the NH MOU Steering Committee and Working Groups. Examples of successes from such partnerships include the completion of the first PHSA-NH-UNBC Project Grant (Phase 2) competition in Spring 2024 (see page #30) and an HRI:ORI partnership to support the new MOU Project Coordinator to facilitate NH-UNBC MOU steering and working group activities for 2025-26.

The 2024-25 HRI Seminar Series. coordinated by HRI Members Dr. Kendra Furber, Dr. Rheanna Robinson, Nuziha Thasneem Shakkir, Leana Garraway and Bree Loeffler, included research talks from external and UNBC scholars, a career development panel discussion, information sessions from provincial health services and funding agencies (First Nations Health Authority and Genome BC) and showcased the research outcomes of UNBC Health Science Honours students (see page #14). In addition to the HRI Seminar Series, 2024-25 saw a full agenda of health research events (see page #12) by visiting scholars with expertise in medical education, agetech and rural/indigenous health service delivery.

The HRI co-hosted an NH-UNBC MOU Education and Training Day on the UNBC campus in Fall 2024 which brought together scholars from UNBC and NH, and we partnered with the Faculty of Human and Health Sciences (FHHS) on their Professorial Lecture for Dr. Davina Banner-Lukaris. We thank members of the Office of the Vice-President of Research and Innovation, Dr. Paula Wood-Adams, Dr. Davina Banner-Lukaris and Mark Barnes, for their support of HRI initiatives and in allowing the HRI to represent UNBC at health research tables locally, provincially and nationally.

Message from the HRI Co-Leads, Continued

The HRI Manager, Leana Garraway and HRI Administrative Assistant. Bree Loeffler continue to be the heart of the HRI team Knowledge supporting the **Svnthesis** Research Librarian, Terri McKellar, Research Skills Development Trainee. Rhonda Thygesen, and student research assistants. We thank the HRI Leadership Council governed members that the strategic direction of the HRI in 2024-25 (see page #8 of HRI report for current members). We sincerely thank departing member, Dr. Wagar Hague (FBE, Business, FSE, Computer Science) for his innovative work on developing HRI Connect for our members; and welcome Dr. Taru Manyanga (DMS, Master of Physiotherapy- North) as the newest member of the HRI Leadership Council. In 2024-25, we expanded student membership to include the highly motivated and engaged MSc level trainees, Mr. Jonathan Dolon (MSc, Health Sciences) and Mr. Jakob Ostberg (MSc, Interdisciplinary Studies) and created an elected position on the HRI Leadership Council.

The first election for this position will be initiated at the HRI Annual General Meeting scheduled for April 24, 2025, where our members will vote for one of three candidates who have been nominated to stand for membership. The addition of this position is a significant step in the evolution of HRI activity governance, that will support diverse membership on the HRI Leadership Council.

In 2025-26, the HRI leadership will dedicate time to the development of communication strategies, cost recovery models and evaluation of HRI services such as the Knowledge Synthesis Centre, HRI event planning and HRI Connect to enhance accessibility and transparency of HRI services. We will continue to lead engagement events to socialize the Northern Hub for Health Research across Northern BC, the province and nationally to achieve our goal of funding success. And finally we will continue to foster and develop existing and new partnerships to support health research for the benefit of Northern BC and beyond.

Summary of Progress Knowledge Synthesis & Exchange

Knowledge Synthesis (KS) Centre

The UNBC HRI Knowledge Synthesis Centre was established in 2019 with the purpose of expanding the capacity of UNBC and partner organizations to ask and answer health focused questions using synthesis methods, enhancing rural and northern applicability of the evidence, and setting up knowledge to be translated into action in policy and practice.

After discussion and advocating for funding, the role of **Knowledge Synthesis Librarian** was developed as a cofunded position between the HRI and UNBC Library, and in May 2024 we welcomed Terri McKellar into this role. Terri's activities this year have included providing valuable services, supports and capacity building to UNBC Faculty, staff and students as well as external partners. Terri had assistance from the HRI Research Skills Development Trainee Rhonda Thygesen.

Research Skills Development Trainee Key supports provided included:

- Collaborative Knowledge Synthesis Projects: Engaging on 12 UNBC led projects, and along with the HRI Co-Leads and Manager, working with our Northern Health partners to develop a pathway for requests from NH to the Centre, and the beginning stages of developing a cost-recovery model and evaluation plan.
- **Methodological Services and Supports:** by providing consultations and methodological expertise, & access to and training for Distiller SR review software.
- Training and Capacity Building: Mentoring new employees, and presenting webinars such as <u>KS Overview</u>: <u>Scoping, Systematic, and Rapid Reviews</u>. Of particular note, Terri created a <u>research guide on knowledge</u> <u>synthesis</u> with the purpose of guiding students, faculty, staff and the community on review methodologies. This resource was launched in September 2024 and within 4 months had received over 700 views.

The guide and the uptake of NH and UNBC faculty with the Centre demonstrate the need and impact the Centre can have on quality improvement and health research. It highlights the role that a librarian can play within a Centre focused on review methodology and the need for reviews in an organization, like NH, that is continuously at capacity.

Northern Hub for Health Research

In 2024-25 the HRI Co-leads, together with the Director of the Northern Centre for Clinical Research (NCCR), have invested significant leadership in driving a UNBC initiative critical to the advancement of Health Research at UNBC. Through the submission of a CFI 2025 Innovation Fund Proposal, UNBC and 3 key partners, Lheidli T'enneh First Nation, UBC and the Northern Health Authority are proposing an Indigenous-informed, purpose-built, technology-leading, health research hub named the Northern Hub for Health Research. The proposal includes a stand-alone interdisciplinary health research building at UNBC and a clinical research space at the University Hospital of Northern BC that will provide core, multi-user research spaces and equipment. The Hub will advance the integration of and innovations from community engaged, clinical and biomedical health research being conducted in Northern BC, catalyzing a shift in how and where health research is conducted in Canada and who benefits from it. Directly aligned with the Vision and Mission of the HRI, the proposal, led by academic, health system and First Nation partners, aims to transform how northern, rural and Indigenous populations engage with health research; creating research infrastructure to generate community prioritized research outcomes, enable clinical research and diversify employment, training and economic opportunities in biotechnology and the life sciences for Northern British Columbians and beyond.



Provincial Health Services Authority

The <u>Provincial Health Services Authority</u> (PHSA), <u>Northern Health</u> (NH) and University of Northern BC (UNBC) entered into a Memorandum of Understanding on November 12, 2013 to collaborate in establishing a mutually beneficial research partnership for northern BC. The UNBC Health Research Institute (HRI) serves as the Secretariat to support PHSA, NH and UNBC in their commitment to enhance research collaboration between the three organizations.

- Recognizes and respects the intellectual property rights of individual researchers and each Partner.
- Mutual respect and acknowledgement of the skills and expertise each Partner brings to the partnership.
- Open and transparent communication between the Partners.

Funding Program

In 2023, PHSA, NH and UNBC made a commitment to continue this partnership and to support a Project Grant program. There will be 3 project grant funding competitions with up to two projects funded per year for a \$45,000 grant. The first call for applications was released in March 2024.

This partnership will also support a seed grant competition in autumn 2025 and 2026.

The goal of the Funding Programs is to enable collaborators from UNBC, NH, and PHSA to work in partnership and initiate new research projects that focus on improving the quality of health services and the health of the population in northern BC.

The HRI will continue to pursue its four strategic directions/goals: knowledge creation, knowledge exchange and translation, fostering linkages, and capacity development. It will implement objectives and activities in a collaborative and networked way, which allows the Institute to be strategic yet flexible and opportunistic in its actions. Key new HRI activities that are planned for the coming year are described below:

HRI Operations

- The HRI Leadership Council will welcome the first elected member.
- There will be a continued focus on partnering with UNBC & external partners to co-host or supported events. This includes the NH & UNBC 2025 Northern BC Research and Quality Conference October 22-23, 2025.

Office of Research and Innovation (ORI)

UNBC has a student first focus that means keeping student needs at the forefront of decision making. For this reason the ORI partnered with HRI to enable the hiring of students for the Knowledge Synthesis Centre in roles that provide training and research experience that will help student learn skills for future academic or employment careers.

The HRI will welcome Nasrin Golzadeh in the new role as Project Manager of the NH-UNBC MOU partnered work. Nasrin will work within the ORI in partnership with the HRI and NH.

Geoffrey R. Weller Library

The HRI will continue to partner with the UNBC Library to support the KS Librarian position for 2025-2026. As well, we look to expand UNBC's capacity for knowledge synthesis by jointly purchasing an institutional license to Covidence systematic review software for use by all UNBC Faculty, staff and students.

Faculty of Human and Health Sciences

This year marked the first partnered event between FHHS and the HRI with the inaugural Professorial Lecture Series. This partnered Professorial Lecture Series will continue, additionally the FHHS and HRI are committed to supporting students and early career researchers with activities, such as Graduate Student Events, other flagship events, and financial support for KS work.

Collaboration for Health Research In Northern BC Funding Program

Part of the **Provincial Health Services Authority, Northern Health and UNBC** partnership, HRI serves as secretariat for this partnership and will run:

- A funding competitions for two \$45,000 project grants in April, 2025 and again in April 2026
- A seed grant competition in autumn, 2025, and again in autumn 2026
