
## Rural medicine learning

#### **Spring physio placements in Kitimat**

Physiotherapy students Nina and Nicole spent several weeks in northwest B.C. on a spring clinical placement at the Kitimat General Hospital, with their travel supported in part by the Trust.

"My time in Kitimat was an incredibly positive experience," said Nina, a second-year student studying in the \*UBC Master of Physical Therapy – North program (MPT-N) at UNBC in Prince George.

"One of the major benefits of my hospital placement there was the broad scope of practice, time split between outpatient and acute care each day, and the additional opportunity to do home visits, school visits and visits to Kitamaat Village."

### FNP grad focuses on Indigenous health

A graduate of the UNBC Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) master's program, Kamal Dewan received the Trust's Family Nurse Practitioner Graduate Award in 2024. He credits his FNP rural placement experiences in Burns Lake, Williams Lake and Quesnel as catalysts for further developing his rural care knowledge.

"In smaller communities, healthcare services are limited. Therefore it is not uncommon for practitioners to encounter skills that may not be as utilized by FNPs in more urban areas, such as suturing, biopsies and casting. Being creative and thinking outside the box were valuable skills I learned."

He is now an FNP at Central Interior Native Health Society in Prince George (on the unceded territory of the Lheidli T'enneh people): "I am very appreciative for having the opportunity to provide services in an interdisciplinary medical clinic that respects the cultural diversity and uniqueness of each individual we serve. I am grateful to learn from Indigenous people, including elders, about their culture and perspectives on health."
