## NRESi COLLOQUIUM


### Special NRESi Film Screening of "This Changes Everything" (2015)

## Cumulative Impacts Research Consortium (CIRC) news

The Cumulative Impacts Research Consortium (CIRC) was recently awarded a \$25 000 knowledge synthesis grant titled "**A scoping review on the community impacts of unconventional natural gas development in northern British Columbia**". This grant will characterize community impacts across 'upstream' gas extracting regions, 'midstream' gas transportation corridors, and 'downstream' gas processing and shipping communities. ## (Government press releases)

### Off-road vehicle registration mandatory on November 1, 2015.

**October 15, 2015—Victoria.** Off-road vehicle registration and safety provisions are mandatory on Crown land effective Nov. 1, 2015, following passage of regulations in support of the Off-Road Vehicle Act. The new regulations will promote safe and responsible use of B.C.'s backcountry, and include provisions on number plate placement, rules for child operators and safety equipment requirements.

### Grant to accelerate uptake of open textbooks

**Dec 1, 2015—Vancouver.** A grant of \$525,000 USD over three years will allow BCcampus to focus on increasing uptake of open resources including textbooks by increasing the value of the resources. The grant is from The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation. The funds will be used to develop support materials for open textbooks such as presentations, test banks and videos, as well as additional faculty reviews to boost credibility and workshops to support faculty in learning how to use and adopt open textbook resources for their classrooms.

### Mount Polley short-term discharge permit approved

**Nov 30, 2015—Williams Lake.** After thorough public consultation, the Province has approved Mount Polley Mining Corporation's application for a short-term permit to treat and then discharge water outside of the mine site. The permit is needed because it is estimated that, under normal precipitation conditions, water levels in Springer Pit will reach permitted capacity in April 2016.

## SUSAN STEVENSON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

As its first project of this kind, the Natural Resources and Environmental Studies Institute (NRESi) has established the Susan Stevenson Scholarship Fund, in memory of wildlife ecologist and NRESi member Susan Stevenson. During a 35-year career built primarily in the BC central interior, Susan designed and implemented important research and inventory projects related to mountain caribou habitat, lichen biology, and silvicultural systems, collaborating with a diverse range of researchers, and gave generously of her expertise to the next generation of scientists. Susan exemplified the Institute's values of interdisciplinary curiosity and unselfish collaboration, and enriched the lives of all those who worked and studied with her.

Efforts have succeeded in reaching the goal of \$15,000 that will be matched by UNBC to allow for an annual award. Award criteria are currently being developed. The inaugural award is hoped to be presented in the 2016-2017 academic year. NRESi would like to thank everyone who contributed to the scholarship! More information will follow in the coming months, as well as award criteria for students interested in applying.

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
