TRAVEL & CONFERENCES

In early May **Gail Fondahl** traveled to the Arctic University of Norway to participate in a planning workshop for a new project, “Challenges in Arctic Governance: Indigenous Territorial Rights in the Russian Federation”, funded by the Norwegian Research Council. The 3-year project brings together colleagues from UNBC, Arctic University of Norway (Tromsø), University of Lapland (Rovaniemi, Finland), Northeastern Federal University (Yakutsk, Russian Federation) and Vilnius University (Vilnius, Lithuania).

In mid-May **Gail** presented an invited paper, “Agenda Setting for Arctic Social Sciences Research: AHDR-II, IASC SHWG & ICARP-III”, at the 22nd International Symposium on Polar Sciences, hosted by the Korean Polar Research Institute in Incheon, South Korea. This was the first time the Symposium had included social sciences in its program.

Zoë Meletis is currently in Halifax, Nova Scotia, attending the Canadian Association of Geographers' Annual Meeting. She will present a paper entitled "Navigating without a compass? A literature review and case study of Wiki use in undergraduate geography education". The paper is co-authored by her, a recent UNBC undergraduate: Linette Lubke, and Grant Potter (of UNBC's Centre for Teaching, Learning, and Technology). It is about the addition of Wiki content creation to the UNBC course Geography 203: Roots, Ruggedness, and Rituals, in 2015, and the three authors' perspectives on this. Zoë appreciates the UNBC Conference Travel Grant that contributed to financing this trip.

Phil Owens, Ellen Petticrew and **Alex Koiter** attended the Canadian Water Resources Association annual meeting in Montreal, 24-27 May 2016. They gave oral presentations within a session on sediment fingerprinting, and Alex led a workshop on the use of Bayesian mixing models within the sediment fingerprinting technique.

Field Education Centre—Aleza Lake Research Forest

A unique log and timber building and classroom officially opened its doors at the Aleza Lake Research Forest on Wednesday, May 11, 2016. The 1,200 square foot Field Education Centre (FEC) of log and timber construction provides a great space for the university's faculty and students, for outdoor learning, field courses and research in forest ecology, forest and ecosystem management and environmental studies. It is also available to host meetings, retreats, training and community events. The FEC will be operated by the Aleza Lake Research Forest Society on a cost recovery basis. It is available for elementary and high school classes, community groups, the forest sector, and local industry for educational and training events (alrf.unbc.ca). The Centre can also provide some overnight accommodation for field researchers and crews, and community groups, from time to time. Befitting its forest setting, the Aleza Field Education Centre strongly incorporates and highlights northern BC wood in almost all facets of its construction, with a high level of craftsmanship throughout. Its construction, spread over two years, included the expertise of 8 local contractors, and materials and supplies from 13 additional local businesses. Construction of the building would not have been possible without the generous support of Dunkley Lumber, the Moss Rock Park Foundation and Integris Credit Union. The Aleza Lake Research Forest began as a B.C. Forest Service Experiment Station in 1924. It was the first experiment station of its kind in the province. Its history spans over nine decades. In 2000, the non-profit Aleza Lake Research Forest Society was established to manage the forest, in collaboration with UNBC.

SUSAN STEVENSON MEMORIAL AWARD

As its first project of this kind, the Natural Resources and Environmental Studies Institute (NRESi) has established the Susan Stevenson Scholarship Fund, in memory of wildlife ecologist and NRESi member Susan Stevenson. During a 35-year career built primarily in the BC central interior, Susan designed and implemented important research and inventory projects related to mountain caribou habitat, lichen biology, and silvicultural systems, collaborating with a diverse range of researchers, and gave generously of her expertise to the next generation of scientists. Susan exemplified the Institute's values of interdisciplinary curiosity and unselfish collaboration, and enriched the lives of all those who worked and studied with her.

Efforts have succeeded in reaching the goal of \$15,000 that will be matched by UNBC to allow for an annual award. Additional contributions to the fund are welcomed. The inaugural award will be presented in the 2016-2017 academic year. NRESi would like to thank everyone who contributed to the scholarship!

The following award criteria for the **Susan Stevenson Memorial Award** have been developed:

Value: \$1,000

Eligibility: Available to a full or part time female graduate student enrolled in either the Masters (NRES) or PhD (NRES) degree programs with a research emphasis in one or more of: wildlife ecology, plant biology, forest ecology, or innovative silvicultural systems and practices that emphasize wildlife management and biodiversity objectives.

Criteria: Satisfactory Academic Standing (3.0 GPA)

Conditions: Student is unable to receive this award more than once.

Recipient Selection: Senate Committee on Scholarships and Bursaries on recommendation of the NRESi Steering Committee. Applicants will provide a statement, not exceeding 500 words in length, explaining how their intended research fits within the areas specified for his award.
