National EcoHealth Course comes to QRRC

This year, the 2 week long national Ecohealth field course finished its last 4 days at the QRRC in Likely. Twelve graduate students and their professors traveled around Likely to talk to local people about the relationship between ecosystem health and human health. Ecohealth is a relatively new field of study that began in the 1990's in Canada.

This interaction between human health and the ecosystems in which we live is now a common observation. However, for much of the history of the public health field, this connection was not readily made. Now, it only makes sense to look at how the ecosystem and the environment in which we live (air, water, and the quality of the natural environment) affect human health and vice versa. The new Ecohealth paradigm overcomes the separation of humans and ecosystems and can address problems using a "broad lens". Using an ecosystem-based approach, health problems can be looked at using ideas of social justice, gender equity, environmental sustainability and stakeholder participation. All of these tools to view human and ecosystem health can be used to create effective policy and action at the local, national, and global levels. *Continued on page 4*

Williams Lake Community Forest

WILLIAMS LAKE – The Williams Lake Indian Band and the City of Williams Lake have been invited to apply together for a new community forest, Cariboo-Chilcotin MLA Donna Barnett announced on behalf of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Minister Steve Thomson.

Bridges Project Update



The QRRC is hosting a series of 3 stakeholder workshops over the course of 6 months. The three themes for the workshops series will be 1) Water, 2) Climate Change, and 3) Salmon. This workshop series will focus on the question: How can researchers from the biological, environmental, and social sciences work with different stakeholders to foster meaningful partnerships to inform policy decisions based on shared knowledge? The answer to this question lies in many interdependent issues stemming from the vast number of intersections between cultural, economic, and ecological factors.
