Timberwolves Triumphant!

BASKETBALL 2010

Following a 17-1 season and five more wins at the provincial and national championships, the UNBC Northern Timberwolves lived up to their #1 ranking and captured a Canadian Colleges' Athletic Association (CCAA) championship for the first time in the history of UNBC Athletics.

The Timberwolves took on the host Southern Alberta Institute of Technology Trojans in the gold medal game and showed why they entered the tournament as the team to beat. The final score was 96-63.

"We were in attack mode from start to finish.

It started from defensive intensity and we made some great shots," says Mike Raimbault, the Timberwolves head coach who earned Canadian coach of the year honours earlier in the week. "It's a team

award and a reflection of the great guys I have on this team. They proved themselves again tonight."

The national championship capped an amazing year for both UNBC basketball teams. The men's and women's teams both finished the regular season with 17 wins and one loss and while the women were upset in the Provincials, the men captured the provincial title in Nanaimo in a prelude to the Nationals. 2009-10 was also a season of individual awards: Mike Raimbault (BC and Canadian coach of the year), Inderbir Singh Gill (CCAA Male Athlete of the Year, BC player of the year, Academic All-Canadian, Provincials and Nationals MVP), and Christine Kennedy (BC player of the year and All-Canadian) were among those...

rewarded for impressive personal performances.

"I'm the happiest player in Canada right now," said Gill after the gold medal game. "This is the best team I've ever played on; every player is like a brother to me."

Nearly 100 UNBC fans including students and staff from Prince George, a dozen local First Nations drummers, the Timberwolf mascot, and alumni now living in Calgary were on hand for history-in-the-making. Despite making up a small portion of the 1000 fans in attendance at the game, they were easily as loud as the fans for the hometown Trojans and they were the talk of the tournament.

"We're used to this type of crowd in Prince George," said Gill after the game. "They're the best fans in Canada."

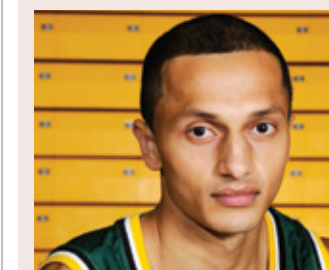
"It was an amazing set of games," added UNBC President George Iwama, who was in Calgary for all three UNBC games at Nationals. "The coaches and players kept their composure, played hard, and brought home the gold. It's what UNBC is all about: a strong team striving to be nothing but the best."



Inderbir Singh Gill was ultimately named CCAA Male Athlete of the Year across all sports.



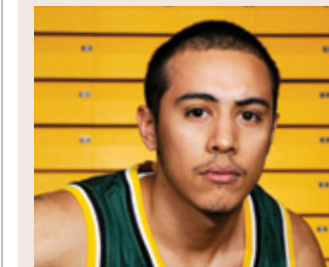

UNBC Goes to the Olympics

UNBC grad Thomas Duerr returns to BC to bobsled for Liechtenstein at the 2010 Games.

It was always my dream to go to the Olympics. In the tiny Principality of Liechtenstein, shortly after graduating from UNBC (BA Economics '06) I got my chance. That fall, I met the only bobsled pilot in Liechtenstein, Michael Klingler, who asked if I wanted to give it a shot. Soon after, I started to compete as his brakeman across Europe and around the world.

In the spring of 2009, the Bobsleigh Federation asked if we wanted to try to make it to the 2010 Olympics in Vancouver. Of course! So we intensified our training.

By January 2010, we were told we had qualified! To put this into perspective, the last time a bobsled team from Liechtenstein qualified for the Games was in 1956.

It was an unbelievable feeling to walk into the Opening Ceremonies at an Olympic Games with more than 60,000 people cheering. After my time at UNBC, I felt like I was being welcomed home.

The day of our first event, 10,000 supporters were on hand to cheer on the participants. We had a great start and were on our way to a very good time until we hit turn 11. Like many bobsledders who came before, we crossed the finish line on our heads. Unfortunately, Michael had a concussion and couldn't compete in the next run so the competitive phase of our Olympics was over.

Although greatly disappointed, we soon began to relax and enjoy the atmosphere at the Whistler Olympic village. We saw so many athletes from so many different places and everyone was having a great time.

During the women's Giant Slalom event, I even found myself chatting with the King and Queen of Sweden!

Just when I was really beginning to relax and have fun, the Liechtenstein Olympic Federation informed me I would have the honour of carrying the flag of Liechtenstein into the Closing Ceremonies.

Flag and head held high, I walked into the stadium.

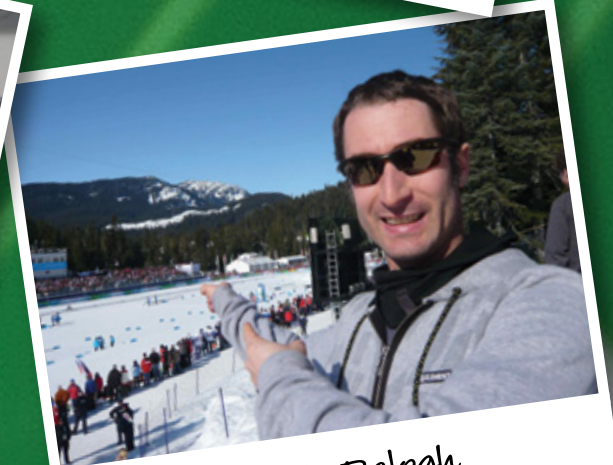

Social Work Success

Jackie Stokes (BSW '96), a long-time child protection advocate and one of the first graduates of UNBC's Social Work program, was honoured recently by the northern branch of the Association of BC Social Workers. Stokes received the Bridget Moran Award for her commitment to children and for her Social Work leadership. She began her career at Mackenzie Counseling Services and was an early advocate for



establishing UNBC and the School of Social Work in northern BC.

Rising from the Rubble

During my time in Haiti, I spent many nights gazing at the vast expanse of Port au Prince. As a geologist, I grimaced at the susceptibility of the capital city to earthquakes: a disaster always seemed inevitable. I prayed whenever I walked beneath a concrete overhang or entered a shoddy-looking building.

I was in a small boat off the southwest coast of the Haitian island of la Gonave when the earthquake struck. I had been working on a water supply project with Concern Worldwide and Haiti Outreach and was about 20 miles from the epicentre.

That first night was one of terrifying tremors and of listening to names of the dead being read on the radio. The entire country slept outside for fear of aftershocks and concern for loved ones not yet found. Members of our team learned of deaths in their families

and left quietly, as cries echoed in the village throughout the night and into the morning.

The scene in Port au Prince will last forever in my mind. Bodies of children and the elderly were tangled in piles of concrete and rebar. Residents with bloodshot eyes and dusty clothing searched for friends. I could visualize what the deceased were doing

the moment they died, the clothes they wore, the unborn babies some women carried. The air was dusty, smoky, stale, and humid. The smells were horrific - people put toothpaste under their noses and jammed leaves up their nostrils. We had no communication with the outside world and no idea what was going on.

We left the city to help organize a relief effort. Haiti Outreach's can-do mentality and ability to handle logistics was immediately applied to mobilize trucks to deliver water

and facilitate medical teams to arrive via the Dominican Republic. We worked tirelessly for weeks.

When it came time for me to leave, I found the most pressing issue in Haiti to be related to shelter and housing. Most of the residents have been forced into makeshift tent cities, which are becoming permanently dependent on international food aid, water, and sanitation. This dependency needs to be stopped by constructing affordable housing on a massive scale.

Haiti's future also depends on an international response focused on rebuilding and encouraging private investment. It is my hope that Haiti will become less centralized through Port au Prince and able to lead their rebuilding with the help of the international community. Hopefully this rebuilding effort will reestablish Haiti as the “Pearl of the Caribbean” it once was.

I will do what I can to make this happen.

James lives in Chicago with his wife Amy and makes annual trips to Northern BC to explore the wilderness with his friends at UNBC.

Endowment Funds Rebound

Last year, in the wake of the financial crisis, the value of the UNBC endowment fund – which supports many student awards and some research activity – had lost millions of dollars in value. Remarkably, much of the 17% decline has been made up through 2009-10. Nevertheless, some endowment funds are still “underwater,” meaning that they are currently worth less than the original amount donated. For 2010, any endowment funds unable to support the disbursement of student awards at their full value will be supplemented by donations that are made to UNBC in support of the University’s greatest needs. Last year, the University also adjusted the annual payout from endowment funds to 3.5% of the value of the fund; down from 5%. In 2009, students received \$1.2 million through 486 awards created by donors.

Giving Back

The 900+ students who will be graduating from UNBC this spring are starting a new tradition... and making UNBC better in the process. The Class of 2010 will be the first to give something back through a class gift, which, this year, will involve the establishment of an alumni lounge. This lounge, located in the Bentley Centre, will be a place for studying, socializing, and displaying photographs of UNBC’s graduating classes going back to 1994. The renovation will raise the profile of the alumni among current students and provide an opportunity for grads to come back and reminisce about their time at UNBC. New grads are being asked to contribute \$20.10 and their efforts are being supported by UNBC President George Iwama and his wife, Marilyn, who are contributing \$2,010 to the cause.

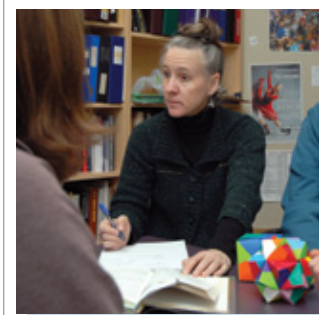
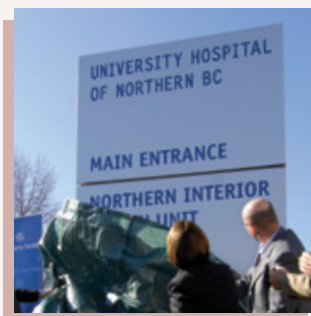
Best in the West

The 19th annual Maclean's magazine ranking of Canadian Universities confirmed UNBC is the best small university in western Canada, and one of the best in the country. Maclean's ranked UNBC third in its category of primarily undergraduate universities.

As in other years, UNBC achieved the high ranking on the strength of its students, high quality faculty, research activity (number one in Canada) and its growing national reputation.

PGRH Now University Hospital

Prince George Regional Hospital has been renamed the University Hospital of Northern British Columbia. "The new name better reflects the current role of the hospital as the main teaching site for the Northern Medical Program," said BC's Health Services Minister Kevin Falcon. The NMP welcomed its first students in 2004 and is a partnership between UNBC and UBC.



National Teaching Award

UNBC Mathematics professor Jennifer Hyndman has been awarded the Excellence in Teaching Award by the Canadian Mathematical Society. The award recognizes sustained and distinguished contributions in

teaching at the undergraduate level and will be presented at the Society's 2010 Summer Meeting in Fredericton, New Brunswick.



Iwama Installed as 4th President

Hundreds of local residents, students, UNBC employees, and even the Consul General of Japan were in attendance for the installation of Dr. George Iwama as he became UNBC's fourth president. The ceremony was

held at the Charles Jago Northern Sport Centre and included the unveiling of the convocation robes, the oath of office, and greetings from representatives of universities and colleges across Canada.

Carbon Footprint Project

The Stellat'en First Nation recently recruited UNBC environmental scientist Stephen Déry to help their community become greener. "Rural First Nations communities face many pollution problems that larger cities don't have to deal with," says Dr. Déry. "I'm trying to help the community overcome factors such as the remoteness of the region, lack of public transportation, the harsh climate, and high energy use for heating."

UNBC students organized a day of fundraising for victims of the Haitian earthquake. "UNBC Stands Up for Haiti: A Day of Fundraising and Awareness" was held at UNBC's Prince George campus on February 24, and featured a variety of events

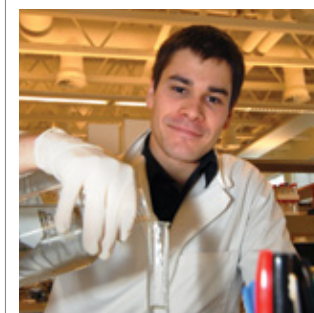

Excellent Paper

UNBC Forestry professor Chris Opio and grad student Zhengzhe He received an Excellent Paper Award at the 2nd International Conference on Strategy and Marketing in Beijing recently. Out of the nearly one hundred entries, their paper on trade restrictions to softwood lumber was one of only two to receive such distinction.



Best JDC West Ever

The teams representing the University of Northern British Columbia at this year's JDC (Jeux de Commerce) West Business Competition gave the University its most successful showing to date. UNBC, which hosted the event with the City of Prince George, took home two first place awards as well as a second and third place finish. The contest involved nearly 550 students from top universities across western Canada and included academic competitions, athletic challenges, a social competition, and a charity initiative.

"The overall consensus was that this was an extremely positive event for all participants," says UNBC student Evan Dusdal, one of the team captains. "Achieving an overall ranking of fourth out of ten teams is a great achievement, considering UNBC was the smallest school to participate."

JDC West ended with a Gala Dinner and Awards Ceremony and a keynote address by Lieutenant-General, the Honourable Roméo Dallaire, who currently serves in the Senate of Canada.

Child health: Home & Away

Canada plans to champion maternal and child health in the world's poorest countries at the upcoming G8 summit in June. Such basic necessities as clean water, vaccination, nutrition, and access to health care can certainly make the difference between life and death for children and their mothers.

But what about here at home?

That was the question that inspired a unique partnership between the National Collaborating Centre for Aboriginal Health (NCCAH), hosted at UNBC, and UNICEF Canada. We found that some of the same issues Canada plans to tackle globally already exist here for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis children:

- **Vaccination?** On-reserve First Nations child immunization rates are 20% lower than the national rate, while Aboriginal children are 50 times more likely to be hospitalized with preventable illnesses.
- **Clean water?** The water supplies for two-thirds of First Nation reserves in 2001 were at risk of contamination. Last year, more than 100 communities had to boil their water.
- **Basic nutrition?** Food insecurity is a critical issue for Inuit children whose families are isolated and depend on hunting for food. Poverty and access to nutritious food play a key role in an epidemic of obesity and diabetes among Aboriginal children.
- **Health care access?** Infant death rates in Nunavut are more than three times the national rate, and eight times the national rate for First Nations people living on-reserve. Such figures are an indicator of the seismic fault lines in how health care is delivered to mothers and children in Canada.

UNICEF typically focuses on the state of well-being of children in developing countries. The NCCAH supports the public health goals of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples in Canada. Our recent joint report, the *Canadian Supplement to the State of the World's Children 2009* represents the first time UNICEF Canada has turned the spotlight on the home front.

We found that Aboriginal children effectively live in a different country.



Our findings are well-known to some, as the challenges for Aboriginal health are longstanding, deep-rooted, and complex. The surprise is that the issues are so persistent. Another surprise is that many of the solutions are at our fingertips.

In Canada, for instance, we still do not have enough data about First Nations, Inuit, and Métis health to allow us to understand key health challenges and propose meaningful interventions. We can change that.

Policy battles between jurisdictions are costing our children not only their health, but in some instances, their lives. This too, we can change.

Similarly, when we understand that the health and well-being of Aboriginal peoples is rooted in socio-economic and historical contexts affecting our cultures, languages, land rights, and self-determination, we can make progress. When we ask: what is the

link between health and educational attainment of our children? Between health and language revitalization among our children? Between building a gymnasium in a remote community and the health of our youth? – then, too, we can make progress.

I believe Canadians wish to close the health gap that exists in this country. I also believe children are at the centre of a web where strands of history and culture, politics and economics, community and environment, intersect. When it comes to health, it is increasingly evident that we can accomplish much if we start with mothers and children.

All children, at home and away, deserve the best we have to give.
