While safety is a year-round priority for our UNBC Community, various campus officials and security department personnel understand that special events precipitate the need for enhanced precautionary and safety efforts.

Safety during our graduation ceremonies is crucial to ensure a smooth and secure event. Here are some essential Safety measures considered for our UNBC events:

1. Upon Arrival

- Traffic Control: Will guide you to a parking spot, as the space around the Northern Sports Centre fills up, you may be offered parking in Lot A. Expect delays when arriving and leaving due to the high volume on Campus.
- Bus and Shuttle Services: Consider taking advantage of bus or shuttle services to alleviate congestion.

2. During the Convocation

- Should you see any suspicious activities or safety concerns, please speak with a uniformed Security Officer.
- In the event of an emergency, please follow the directions of the Speaker and event personnel wearing high visibility vests.
- Emergency exits are available on both sides of the Northern Sports Centre from ground level. From other floors, proceed to marked staircases during an evacuation.

Remember, safety doesn't detract from the celebration—it enhances it by providing peace of mind for everyone involved.
