4.0 President's Report

6.0 Question Period

A Senator asked whether, in relation to Dr. Iwama's report on the 2015 Canada Winter Games, UNBC has struck a committee to deal with this event. Dr. Iwama responded that Vice President van Adrichem sits on the city's committee, which had just begun generating decision items. Dr. Iwama agreed that a UNBC committee would be useful, and he anticipated matters coming to Senate for decision.

It was questioned if there were any updates on the status of Bill 18. President Iwama responded that the Research Universities' Council of British Columbia (RUCBC) had prepared a position containing commentary on the proposals of the legislation and provided that information to Board Chairs. He added that he would get an update from RUCBC and, if necessary, forward the information electronically to Senators.

President's Report Senate meeting of March 21, 2012 Prepared by Charlene Myers

Dr. Iwama reminded Senators that the provincial budget provides for an increase of 0% this year, and cuts of 1% next year and 1.5% in the following year, to the post-secondary education sector. In response to the budget, the Presidents of BC post-secondary institutions have sent a letter thanking the Ministry for support for deferred maintenance costs but expressing concern regarding the fiscal constraints on the system in the coming years. Dr. Iwama added that these challenges will be met by looking at areas where savings can be realized and, more importantly, strategic initiatives that can be undertaken to prepare the University for the cuts anticipated in the second and third years of the budget (and in the years beyond that) so that the University's financial position can be strengthened for the future. President Iwama stressed that the levels of funding provided by the provincial government in previous years may never return, so it is becoming increasingly important to seek funding sources externally. The economy in this region is picking up, and Dr. Iwama indicated that he anticipates a need for training and education. He added that industry is limited not by technology but by matters of governance, and UNBC and the northern Colleges could assist with meeting these challenges.

With regard to enrolment, efforts continue in a push to convert applicants to registrants. Dr. Iwama thanked University community members who have participated in the initiative to contact applicants by telephone, and added that applications are up by several hundred. Furthermore, awareness of UNBC is increasing as a result of the current advertising campaign.

Dr. Iwama reported that steps forward appear to be underway in relation to the Wood Innovation and Design Centre (WIDC). The Ministry will be issuing a Request for Qualifications and Treasury Board approval has been granted for developing full proposals. The WIDC is scheduled to be built on the previous Prince George Hotel site, and will probably not be as tall as initially planned. Construction activity on the WIDC should start sometime in the coming year.

The 2015 Canada Winter Games committee is pressing UNBC for a decision about accommodating athletes during the games. As a result, Dr. Iwama indicated that UNBC needs to determine whether the University can accommodate an extra week of missed classes. The Registrar responded that he has investigated the matter and there is no flexibility at the start of the January semester, so the missed week of classes would need to be accommodated at the end of the semester. If the semester was to include an extra week of missed classes, the examination period end date would need to be extended from April 25 to April 30 or May 2. However, extending the semester would be problematic in the sense that it would cut into the time needed for processing student applications for graduation. Dr. Iwama stated that President's Executive Council will examine the issue and he will likely bring something to the next Senate meeting for decision, as the matter needs to be addressed quickly. There will be a significant presence of young people in Prince George during the Games and Dr. Iwama pointed out that this is a great opportunity to expose them to UNBC and leave them with good memories of the University.

Dr. Iwama reported that encouraging words had been received from the Ministry with regard to starting an Engineering program in the coming months. The University continues with planning and is preparing scenarios for graduate and undergraduate engineering programs. Dr. Belinda Larisch is gathering information regarding laboratory costs, for instance. The University wants to ensure that it provides the Ministry with accurate financial information for capital and operating costs, student awards, and other related expenditures.

- Rate increase 2% increase in tuition fees (effective May 1 for undergraduates; September 1 for graduates); assumed tuition limit policy will remain at 2%
- Enrolment No overall projected growth incorporated in budget. Planned enrolment equal to 2011/12, except domestic undergraduate which incorporates a 2% growth estimate and international undergraduate which is reduced by \$400,000 contingency (see table below)
- MAVED funding remains based on FTE levels that are in excess of actual projected levels

Outcomes (pp. 4-6)

- Beginning with a deficit of over \$1 million the budget was balanced for 2012/13 by:
 - Revising benefit rate
 - Reducing the CERR allocation by \$200,000
 - Reducing transfers to other funds on a one-time basis by about \$240,000
 - Increasing projected salary savings by \$150,000 for 2012/13. All positions will be reviewed prior to posting to determine best strategic use of funds



Outcomes (cont'd.)

- Minimizing impact of inflationary pressures to the extent possible
- Reducing costs where possible, eg. sabbatical replacement, \$40,000 in ITS
- No new positions added
- Strategic Investment Fund (SIF) Funding for Intl. Ops,
 Communications and Digital Media program delivery previously
 funded from SIF have been moved to base budget due to the value
 to overall operations. No funding available for new SIF initiatives



Outcomes (cont'd.)

- Effect of the foregoing is to eliminate all flexibility going in to 2013/14 and beyond. With announced reductions to provincial grant, continuing with a long term planning process to "generate changes to improve organizational effectiveness and create an environment that will allow the university to grow in strategic directions"
- Budget is balanced with total revenues and expenses at \$67.2 million

1. Outlook

(a) Enrolment Challenges

Our total enrolment target (10/11), as set by the Provincial Government was 3,431 FTE.

Actual 3,087 FTE resulting in a gap of 18%- a gap of 700 FTE.

Provincial Government funding is based on targeted numbers, not actual numbers, for that reason UNBC has received funding based on 3,431 FTE.

- (b) Budgetary challenges
 - No cut in provincial funding in 2012/13.
 - 1.0% reduction in 2013/14
 - 1.5% reduction in 2014/15

Outlook...2

- Planning projections for the budget years ahead (2012/2013 2013/2014) show, a deficit of \$0.9 million for 2012/2013, \$1.6 million and \$2.4 million respectively for 2013/2014 and 2014/2015.
- Our cash position (\$30 million) from the Balance Statement of the 2011 Audited Statements is positive. We recognize that we have some months of expenditure ahead. But still we expect it to be a substantive positive number.
- Carry forward funds are substantial (\$2.5 million in 2011)

2. Present Strategy and its Limitations

- Present strategy "cheese-slice approach" cut expenditure across budgetary holders by not replacing existing faculty vacancies (management by attrition).
- UNBC has initiated a policy of increasing the visibility of the university by selective advertisement campaign (in areas like Vancouver, Calgary, and Toronto).
- Limited idea on its impact on enrolment? The important elements monitoring and evaluation -- in strategic marketing project management are not being followed.
- Low-risk and Low-return strategy.

Suggested Strategy

- Strategy of cost-containment and at the same time embark on a policy of growth.
- The fundamental basis of the proposed strategy should be "student-centered" give more scholarships to students at graduate and undergraduate levels and attract students. UNBC survey on students offered admission but did not take that offer shows that scholarships are important determinant of choice of university.
- This strategy will also have a multiplier impact on the community as \$1 spent on tuition leads to \$4 spending in the community by students.

3. Is Public Funding Model Sustainable?

- If post-secondary institutions like UNBC depend only on government funding, their future sustainability will be substantially compromised.
- Suggest diversification diversify the present revenue base by looking at fundraising on an immediate and enhanced basis.

4. Branding

- First we were "The University in the North, for the North", then the "Small Research Intensive University." and now the "Green University."
- Is there any evaluation whether this shift in branding has added value to UNBC?

5. Budget Cuts

- Cheese-slice method adopted presently extremely counterproductive, ineffective and may jeopardize the good ranking we enjoy among small universities (in Maclean's magazine).
- Allow areas (programs) which has the potential to grow by attracting more students.

6. International Partnerships

- BC Premier Christy Clark announced her plan to increase by 50 percent the number of international students attending universities and colleges in British Columbia.
- We should make use of this opportunity.

7. Summary of recommendations

- 1.A "student-centered" enrolment strategy is advocated which gives more scholarships to students at graduate and undergraduate levels and attract students.
- 2.UNBC should pursue active "fundraising" to offset the decline in provincial government grant. UNBC Board can help in augmenting the Endowment funds.
- 3.UNBC administration should have a fresh look at its "cheese-slice method" in order to solve the yearly deficit. In its place a "growth" oriented strategy should be pursued.
- 4.UNBC should take opportunity of international student enrolment and international partnerships initiatives set by our provincial government.
