#### Objective:

The objective of the Senate Mentorship Program is to prepare new senators to be informed regarding the procedures of senate and to provide them with information pertaining to any ongoing discussions. Further, the program is intended to answer questions new senators may have so that they can follow along and contribute to discussions. The hope is that this will promote healthy discussions in a collegial manner.

#### Definition of informal mentorship:

Informal mentorship has little organized structure and discussion should be led by the mentee in areas where guidance is needed. The mentor should be a person with experience, knowledge, and advice that can be shared with another person upon request.

#### Understanding the roles and expectations of senators:

Principally, the role and expectation of a senator is to make an informed vote on decisions pertaining to academic governance, and further, to contribute meaningfully and purposefully to discussions in the Senate Chambers.

#### From the University Act:

#### Powers of senate of university named in section 3

- **37** (1) The academic governance of the university is vested in the senate and it has the following powers:
  - (a)to regulate the conduct of its meetings and proceedings, including the determination of the quorum necessary for the transaction of its business, and the election of a vice chair at least annually, who is to chair meetings in the absence of the president;
  - (b)to establish committees it considers necessary and, by 2/3 vote of its members present, to delegate to one or more committees those of its powers as it may determine;
  - (c)to determine all questions relating to the academic and other qualifications required of applicants for admission as students to the university or to any faculty, and to determine in which faculty the students pursuing a course of study must register;
  - (d)to determine the conditions under which candidates must be received for examination, to appoint examiners and to determine the conduct and results of all examinations;
  - (e)to establish a standing committee to meet with the president and assist the president in preparing the university budget;
  - (f)to consider, approve and recommend to the board the revision of courses of study, instruction and education in all faculties and departments of the university;
  - (g)to provide for courses of study in any place in British Columbia and to encourage and develop extension and correspondence programs;
  - (h)to provide for and to grant degrees, including honorary degrees, diplomas and certificates of proficiency, except in theology;
  - (i)to recommend to the board the establishment or discontinuance of any faculty, department, course of instruction, chair, fellowship, scholarship, exhibition, bursary or prize;
  - (j)to award fellowships, scholarships, exhibitions, bursaries and prizes;
  - (k)to determine the members of the teaching and administrative staffs who are to be members of each faculty;

(I)to make rules for the management and conduct of the library;

(m)to establish policies regarding the conservation of heritage objects and collections that are owned by or in the possession of the university or any of its faculties, divisions, departments or other agencies;

(n)to provide for the preparation and publication of a university calendar;

(o)to make recommendations to the board considered advisable for promoting the interests of the university or for carrying out the objects and provisions of this Act;

(p)to deal with all matters reported by the faculties, affecting their respective departments or divisions:

(q)to establish a standing committee to consider and take action on behalf of the senate on all matters that may be referred to the senate by the board;

(r)subject to the approval of the board, to enter into agreements with any corporation or society in British Columbia entitled under any Act to establish examinations for admission to the corporation or society, for the purpose of conducting examinations and reporting results, and those corporations or societies have power to enter into the agreements;

(s)to make rules respecting the conduct and financing of examinations referred to in paragraph (r) and other examinations conducted by the senate under any other Act;

(t)to make rules respecting the reporting of results of examinations referred to in paragraphs (r) and (s);

(u)to set the terms of affiliation with other universities, colleges or other institutions of learning, and to modify or terminate the affiliation;

(v)to establish a standing committee of final appeal for students in matters of academic discipline;

(w)to establish a standing committee on relations with other post secondary institutions in British Columbia:

(x)to require any faculty to establish an advisory committee consisting of students of the faculty and members of the community at large.

#### What are the expectations/roles of mentors?

The expectation and role of the mentor is to:

- -Answer questions regarding or add clarification to the processes of Senate or motions in Senate;
- -Help introduce senators to others to form connections;
- -Encourage senators to maintain a set of principles that may or may not align with the majority of senators;
- -Provide space for dialogue about difficult matters, such as when one person votes in opposition to the rest of Senators.

#### What is not role of Mentors?

- -To propagate power imbalances;
- -To influence the views or votes of new or existing Senators.

#### What are the expectations/roles of mentees?

- -To fulfill duties as a senator
- -To foster a relationship with their mentor
- -To encourage dialogue (i.e. ask questions when you have them and follow up)

#### Feedback Process:

The feedback process will add a standing Mentors/Mentee report on agenda to encourage transparency if desired. This will add an opportunity for other Senators that are not involved in the process to be informed and to ask questions.

In addition, a meeting will be held prior to, during, and after the mentorship.

Prior to the mentorship, the meeting will be to gauge participants' expectations, and to coach mentors regarding what they know and what they need to know.

During the mentorship, the meeting will see how participants feel about the program. The meeting will be done in three stages, first with just the mentors, then the mentees, and finally a combined group. An informal report will be generated for senate.

After the mentorship, the meeting will be done in three stages, first with just the mentors, then the mentees, and finally a combined group. This will generate an informal report for senate on outcomes and provide comments for the future.

The intent is to make this course available to students who have an adequate background in Chemistry.

**Motion:** That the expression of recognition of aboriginal rights as presented below for our admission processes, to be added on page 21of the 2018/2019 graduate and page 20 of the 2018/2019 undergraduate calendar, be approved as proposed.

1. Effective date: September 2019

#### 2. Rationale for the proposed revisions:

The new approach will allow any Indigenous peoples whose ancestral lands were arbitrarily divided by the creation of the Canada US border to be considered domestic students rather than international students.

The Jay Treaty secured the rights of Indigenous peoples to continue to move freely cross the US-Canada border, by land or water, in order to carry on trade or commerce with each other as they had done before the border was established.

This policy addresses some of the issues presented in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's recommendation to recognize Aboriginal rights and the effects of colonialization on Aboriginal peoples.

Examples of recent wording from other post-secondary institutions:

#### **Emily Carr**

This opportunity is open only to qualified individuals who self-identify as Indigenous Peoples of North America or Peoples of Turtle Island, including those who identify as First Nations (status, non-status, treaty or non-treaty), Métis, Inuit, or Alaskan Native, Native American, and Native Hawaiian Peoples. This initiative is a special program under the British Columbia Human Rights Tribunal.

#### VIU

Vancouver Island University (VIU) is excited to welcome students living outside Canada with an ancestral connection to Canadian Indigenous groups to study at the lower domestic tuition rate

VIU's Board of Governors has recently approved this initiative as a commitment to fulfill the recommendations of Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission. It also supports the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Jay Treaty of 1795. This treaty secured the rights of Indigenous peoples to freely cross the US-Canada border, by land or water, in order to carry on trade or commerce with each other as they had done before the border was established.

We look forward to working with our communities and welcoming students under this program and to continuing to support initiatives that invest in and actively support reconciliation with Canada's Indigenous nations.

Consultation has included discussion at Senate and sub committees prior to this submission, The

First Nations Centre representatives have been given an opportunity to provide feedback. The motion will be brought to SCFNAP as well as part of normal Senate review processes.

### Search Committees for Academic Vice-Presidents and other Senior Academic Administrators

S. 27(2)(f) of the University Act [RSBC 1996] c. 468, grants the Board the power: with the approval of senate, to establish procedures for the recommendation and selection of candidates for president, deans, librarians, registrar and other senior academic administrators as the board may designate;

- Scope These Procedures apply to Search Committees for Senior Academic Administrators, including: Academic Vice-Presidents, Associate Academic Vice-Presidents, Vice-Provosts, Academic Deans, Senior Academic Directors, the Registrar, the University Librarian and any other senior academic administrator as the Board may designate. The Search Committees for the President, and for the Associate Vice-President Medicine are addressed in separate Procedures.
- **2. Role of Search Committees** Search Committees are advisory to the President and are tasked with generating ranked short lists of candidates for positions. Each Committee will:
  - review the position and desired qualifications and qualities of candidates, in consultation with appropriate constituents and constituency groups
  - review and advise on advertising
  - review the *General Search Process Rules* outlined below, and recommend reasonable modifications to the Chair, as appropriate for specific searches or positions
  - oversee the fair and equitable application of the *General Search Process Rules*, with the advice of Human Resources professionals, and external search consultants if applicable
  - Ensure best practices are followed with respect to confidentiality and declarations of conflict of interest and bias
  - Monitor and encourage the application of best practices in equity and diversity in the posting and advertising, in the search and interview process, and in the making of hiring recommendations.

#### 3. General Search Process Rules

- a. A new search committee will be assembled for each Senior Academic Administrator search.
  - b. The University will ensure that prior to the Committee commencing its work, Committee members are provided with training and orientation on best practices with respect to equity and diversity in recruitment and search processes.
- c. The Chair in consultation with the Search Committee will consider current best practices and

- the advice of Human Resources professionals, and search consultants where applicable, in determining the appropriate level of openness of each search, and in the interests of ensuring the broadest and most qualified applicant pool.
- d. Senior Administrators and Program Chairs will have an opportunity to meet short-listed candidates in informal sessions at the appropriate stage of the search process. Others may be included for specific searches, at the recommendation of the Search Committee Chair in consultation with the Search Committee.
- e. In making a recommendation, to the Board in the case of Vice-Presidential searches, and to the President for all other searches, the Search Committee Chair will provide a fulsome report on the search process, deliberations, and rationale for the recommendation.
