Dr. Dale reported that the federal budget is good news for researchers and research-intensive universities as it contains additional funding for several initiatives. With regard to the provincial budget, there were decreases of 1%, or approximately \$20M, for the Ministry of Advanced Education, which may affect program delivery.

Dr. Dale also reported that investigation into the implications of mounting a revised semester structure is ongoing.

Dr. Dale noted that next Wednesday, March 5 at 3:30pm, he would be holding a Fireside Chat in the Senate Chambers to bring the University community up to date regarding the role of the interim President, the budgets, and the University Conversations.

Dr. Young reported on the following matters:

- the timeline of the search for the Dean of Regional Programs has been extended for advertising purposes and Dean Schorcht has agreed to serve in the position in an Acting capacity
- more "policy on policy" is required with regard to the process for creating and managing policies and work is underway to resolve some of those concerns
- the Senate Committee on Academic Affairs and the Senate Committee on First Nations and Aboriginal Peoples are both holding extraordinary meetings to address policy concerns and other issues
- the budget roll-up and 4% cuts are successfully nearing completion
- meetings are being pursued with other British Columbia universities that have expressed a desire to collaborate with UNBC

Tri-Agency Framework: Responsible Conduct of Research An Introduction

Objectives

- Responsibilities of researchers, institutions and Agencies in the Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR)
- Panel on Responsible Conduct of Research (PRCR) and the Secretariat on Responsible Conduct of Research (SRCR)



RCR Framework: Objectives

- Funding decisions based on accurate and reliable applications
- Responsible use of public funds; in line with agreements
- Agency-funded research highest quality; able to withstand scrutiny
- Fairness in the conduct of research and in the investigation of allegations
- Harmonization of Agency processes
- Transparency



Researcher Responsibilities

In accordance with the RCR Framework, researchers must:

- Promote research integrity
- Provide true and accurate information to the Agencies
- Manage Agency funds responsibly
- Comply with Agency policies
- Take proactive steps to rectify a breach of Agency policy



Breaches of Tri-Agency Policies

- Breach of Tri-Agency Research Integrity Policy
- Fabrication
- Falsification
- Plagiarism
- Destruction of research records
- Redundant publications
- Invalid authorship
- Inadequate acknowledgment
- Failure to manage conflicts of interest in research appropriately



Breaches of Tri-Agency Policies (cont'd)

- Misrepresentation in an agency application, in related documents (e.g., progress reports)
- Mismanagement of funds inaccurate or false information about grant account expenditures
- Non-compliance with Agency policy or requirements for certain types of research
- Human research ethics policy; animal care guidelines, etc.



Agency Recourse Options: Researchers

- Issue a letter of concern
- Declare the researcher ineligible to apply for funding for a defined time period or indefinitely
- Terminate remaining instalments of the grant or award
- Seek a refund of all or part of the funds already paid
- Declare the researcher ineligible to serve on agency committees (e.g., peer review, advisory boards)
- Request that the researcher correct the research record
- Other recourse available by law



Serious Breaches

Definition: A breach that jeopardizes the safety of the public or brings the conduct of research into disrepute

- Assessment
- Nature of the breach
- Level of experience of the researcher
- Impact of the breach
- Other relevant factors



Decision

- Made by Agency President, with the advice of PRCR
- Disclosure
- Researcher's consent to disclosure at the time of application allows Agency President to disclose personal information in instances of serious breach



Examples of Serious Breaches

- Deliberate misuse of research grant funds for personal benefit not related to research
- Knowingly publishing research results based on fabricated data
- Obtaining grant/award funds from the Agencies by misrepresenting one's credentials, qualifications and/or research contributions in an application
- Recruiting human participants or animals into a study with significant risks or harms without appropriate approvals, or not following approved protocols



Institutional Responsibilities

- In accordance with the RCR Framework, Institutions must:
- Implement a policy to address allegations of policy breaches
- Make certain that all their researchers who apply for or hold Agency funding adhere to the Framework
- Report on results of inquiries/investigations to Agencies when Agency funds are involved



Institutional Investigations Involve

- An initial inquiry to determine if the allegation is responsible an investigation is required
- An investigation to determine the validity of an allegation, in which both the complainant and respondent are heard
- An investigation Committee with appropriate expertise at least one external member not currently affiliated with the Institution
- Reasonable timelines for completing an inquiry and/or investigation
- Reporting the findings internally and to the Secretariat
- Making a decision on action to be taken
- Communicating with relevant parties



Reporting Requirements & Timelines

Institutions must report to the Secretariat:

- As soon as possible when an allegation involving Agency funds relates to significant financial, health, safety or other risks
- Within specified timelines, of the results of inquiries/investigations involving Agency funds



Inquiry

Two months from date of receipt of allegation:

- Investigation: additional five months following inquiry
- Extensions may be possible consult with SRCR
- Institutions are not required to report to the Secretariat when Agency funds are not involved
- If no Agency funds involved, but Secretariat was aware of allegations, Institutions must still inform SRCR that a review of the allegation was conducted



Agencies' Responsibilities

- Respond to enquiries related to the Framework
- Provide interpretations of the Framework
- Address allegations of breaches of Agency policies
- Implement recourse for confirmed breaches


The Residence Meal Plan




